adventurous 'international tourist travel'.

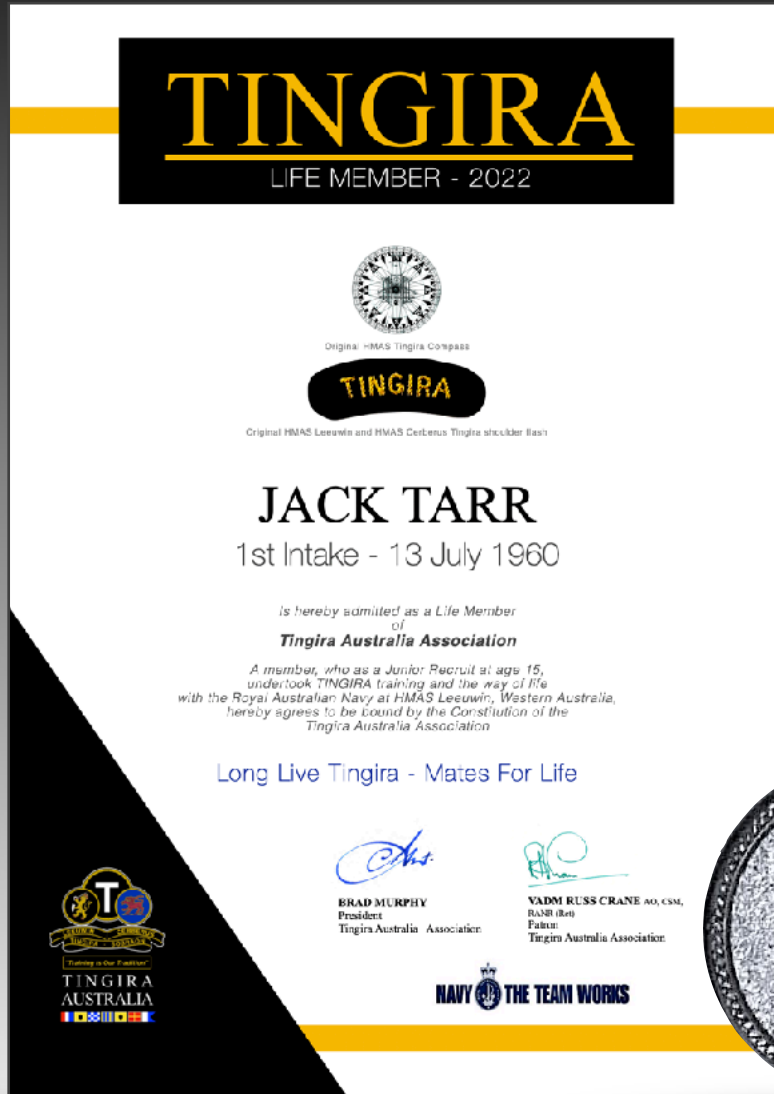
No official business was presented by members for the meeting, National Secretary Mark Lee gave a brief update of present set up for the 2025 JR Reunion in Perth set down for November next year.

Budget Defence Media Release

The Albanese Labor Government is delivering historic investments in the Australian Defence Force (ADF), our people, our capabilities, our defence industry and our region, as we further strengthen the defence of our nation.

The 2024 National Defence Strategy and 2023 Defence Strategic Review call for significant and urgent changes to our defence settings to respond to our complex strategic environment and deliver an integrated, focused Defence Force.

The 2024-25 Budget sees Defence funding increase to \$764.6 billion over the decade to support a more capable and self-reliant Defence Force that can safeguard Australia's security into the future.

At the centre of the Albanese Government's renewed investment in Defence is the allocation of \$330 billion over the decade to 2033-34 for the rebuilt Integrated Investment Program – a significant lift compared to the \$270 billion allocated as part of the 2020 Defence Strategic Update and 2020 Force Structure Plan.

This includes:

- ***An additional \$5.7 billion over the forward estimates – the largest increase to Defence spending over a forward estimates period in decades.***
- ***An additional \$50.3 billion over the next decade.***

As a result of these significant investments, the annual Defence budget will grow to an estimated \$100 billion by 2033-34 compared to \$53 billion this financial year.

This will see Defence funding as a proportion of Gross Domestic Product reach over 2.3% by 2033-34 – more than 0.2% higher than the spending trajectory set by the former Coalition government.

The Albanese Government's commitment to Defence is an investment in a future made in Australia – ensuring we keep Australians safe, while delivering jobs and opportunities right across the country for decades to come.

Integrated Investment Program. The 2024 Integrated Investment Program (IIP) supports the Albanese Government's funding decisions by prioritising investments that help meet our changing strategic environment.

This will include \$11.1 billion over the decade to support the Government's response to the Surface Combatant Fleet review, providing a larger and more lethal surface fleet, and an additional \$1 billion over the next four years to accelerate ADF preparedness including long-range strike, targeting and autonomous systems. 2024-25 Budget initiatives.

As the 2024-25 Budget outlines, the Albanese Government is also investing in other crucial areas to strengthen our defence settings, including:

- ***\$81.9 million towards defence industry for critical jobs, including for scholarships, attracting and recruiting apprentices under the***

Shipbuilding Employment Pathways Initiative, supply chain support and uplifting the defence industrial workforce.

- ***\$166.2 million over five years from 2023-24 in grants to support small and medium businesses and local defence industry as part of the Defence Industry Development Strategy.***
- ***\$28 million over 2024-25 to 2027-28 to implement reforms under the Defence Trade Controls Amendment Act 2024, including to support industry engagement and accelerate trade between AUKUS partners.***
- ***\$232.3 million of international military support and assistance activities between 2023-24 and 2024-25, including \$144.3 million in additional military support to Ukraine.***
- ***\$17.5 million to establish a new Parliamentary Joint Committee on Defence to enhance parliamentary oversight and understanding of Defence's role in responding to Australia's challenging strategic environment.***

The Defence funding confirmed in the 2024-25 Budget advances the implementation of the Government's six immediate priorities announced in response to the Defence Strategic Review.

It will also deliver the capabilities required to achieve an integrated, focused Defence Force across all domains – maritime, land, air, space and cyber – in line with the concept of National Defence.

Importantly, the 2024-25 Budget confirms the Albanese Government's commitment to set out an affordable, achievable, and sustainable plan for now and the future which delivers the capabilities, jobs and investment in local Australian industry needed to support our Defence Force and safeguard Australia's security. COLLINS CLASS SUBS

Life type extension...

The Collins Class submarine fleet's Life of Type Extension (LOTE) will provide the nation with a potent, conventionally powered submarine capability into the 2030s.

The Collins boats are internationally regarded among the best conventional submarines in the world. ASC will continue to deliver high levels of submarine performance and availability to the Royal Australian Navy as the LOTE project is implemented.

During the project, ASC will replace the propulsion systems, diesel engines, generators, and the power conversion and distribution

systems. There will also be a cooling system update and a range of hull assessments. ASC will integrate the new equipment into the existing command and control system.

The LOTE will be implemented on all six Collins Class submarines.

The project is currently in the detailed design phase and ASC is working closely with the Royal Australian Navy, the Naval Shipbuilding and Sustainment Group, Australian suppliers and international partners to deliver the Navy's specific requirements/

ASC is on schedule to undertake First of Class LOTE implementation with HMAS Farncomb in 2026. [DoD](#)

MERITORIOUS UNIT CITATION

HMAS TOBRUK (II)

In the lead up to Anzac Day this year a number of former RAN Junior Recruits were among HMAS Tobruk (II) veterans who were presented with retrospective Meritorious Unit Citations (MUC) for service in Somalia in 1993.

This followed a Defence Honours and Awards review initiated in 2021 that investigated the service of ADF personnel involved in the Somalia conflict. The findings of that review were released in 2023 coinciding with the 30th anniversary of Operation SOLACE and a reunion of ADF Somalia veterans in Canberra.

The review determined that the 1st Battalion (Group) Royal Australian Regiment, HMAS Tobruk (II) and the four ADF Australian Service Contingents that deployed to Somalia met the criteria for a retrospective award of a MUC.

Defence Honours and Awards, ably assisted by Captain Paul Fothergill, OAM, RAN, the Director of Navy Honours and Awards, worked tirelessly to ensure that as many Tobruk veterans as possible were in receipt of their insignia prior to Anzac Day 2024.

This saw a number of small presentation ceremonies conducted at naval bases around Australia while other veterans opted to have theirs sent by mail.

At the time of writing the following former RAN Junior Recruits were among those awarded a MUC.

CHRIS KALETA - 30th intake Marks

TONY HOWARD - 59th intake Ramsay

JOHN PERRYMAN - 70th intake Stevenson

WAYNE SPRINGHALL - 84th intake Ramsay

HMAS Tobruk's deployment to Somalia began on Boxing Day 1992 when the ship sailed from Sydney for Townsville to embark elements of 1 RAR and 3/4 Cavalry Regiment. HMAS Jervis Bay preceded Tobruk to Somalia and at that time it was the largest military sealift deployment since Australia's involvement in the Vietnam War.

Tobruk was to remain in the area of operations throughout the deployment in support of Australian and coalition forces operating ashore as well as performing a variety of humanitarian and maritime security functions. She was again joined by HMAS Jervis Bay for the back-loading operation that took place in May 1993.

FOOTNOTE - There was of course the official HMAS Tobruk ship's badge - hence my use of the motto in my article - Faithful and Strong but we also used the attached graphic on a T-shirt that a mate of mine back in Australia produced for us while we were deployed.

For a long time HMAS Tobruk had a good relationship with the WWII Rats of Tobruk Association and the crew adopted a version of that for ourselves - The Tobruk Rats

That's why we were '**Rats to the Rescue**'. JP



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HMAS *Tobruk (II)* was a 'heavy lift' ship designed to transport vehicles, equipment, personnel, ammunition and stores. She was designed for joint Navy and Army amphibious operations. In early 1993, *Tobruk* was part of Australia's largest military sea-lift operation since the end of the Vietnam War. *Tobruk*, including members from the Royal Australian Navy Clearance Diving Team 1, embarked elements of 817 Squadron and the Ship's Army Detachment, conducted meritorious operational service in support of United Nations Security Council Resolution 794 to end hostilities in Somalia and established a secure environment for the distribution of humanitarian aid.

On 9 December 1992, the Command Team of *Tobruk* was notified of the ship's tasking to Operation SOLACE, thereby initiating cancellation of crew leave and any necessary crew recalls. At the time, *Tobruk* was in a planned major maintenance period including a main engine rebuild having just spent over six months deployed during the previous year. The crew and contractors worked around the clock to enable *Tobruk* to depart Sydney on 26 December 1992. The ship's company continued to work on ensuring that all equipment and systems were returned to, and in operational condition, as the ship would be required to remain at the highest level of capability for the duration of the deployment. The crew morale was high, despite the expectation that the ship would be deployed for a further six months, after just coming off a demanding operational deployment schedule the previous year.

During the period 19 January 1993 to 20 May 1993, *Tobruk* served for a cumulative period of 89 days in the Operation SOLACE area of operations with the residual periods being taken up with the conduct of logistic re-supply operations that were in direct support of the land based operations. Required to remain at a high operational readiness state throughout, the demands on the ship and her ship's company were constant, and sustained, in terms of direct support provided to the Commander Australian Forces Somalia and United Nations elements. *Tobruk* conducted five operational visits to Mombasa in Kenya during the period, moving a total of 1,450 tonnes of cargo in order to provide necessary operational support.

Tobruk provided an extremely versatile and flexible support capability to the land and maritime forces within the area of operations. *Tobruk* conducted tasks within the logistic arena, provided surveillance support, aerial troop transport, as well as communications relaying and monitoring which contributed to the overall operation. A significant number of tasks involved manual work that routinely took place in hot, uncomfortable and at times, dangerous conditions particularly when unloading at Mogadishu port. The teamwork and ethos exhibited by the crew during those evolutions was outstanding. Additionally, *Tobruk* maintained her maritime operational capability by routinely operating in company with coalition ships, conducting underway replenishments, seamanship, and gunnery serials off the coast of Somalia.

Throughout Operation SOLACE the ship's company of *Tobruk* remained flexible and adaptable to changing circumstances in order to meet mission objectives. They performed duties that were unique to the deployment with a high level of ability, commitment and collective professionalism whilst maintaining a very high morale. Their commitment to the task contributed to the success of the overall mission and was certainly meritorious and deserving of recognition.

Donated to the RAN...

The Tingira Collection of memorabilia items has found a new resting place as a donation to the RAN Seapower Centre in Canberra.

Seapower Director Captain Alastair Cooper met with the Secretary, Mark Lee, who had been instructed by the National Tingira Committee to take the collection to a new level from the 'shoebox closet' it has been contained in gathering dust over the past decade.

"It is certainly a welcome gesture by the Tingira Australia association to break up their collection and spread items associated with HMAS Tingira and HMAS Leeuwin, back into our navy museum collections'.

'We see many navy associations take on their namesake collections but sadly, when these associations come to a final close in later years, many of those items just find their way to the local skip bin and that history is lost, forever.

"Some of those items do make it to our navy museum curators. What is usually missing is the story behind the item, where has it come from and what was its voyage in the pages of our naval history? Without

the story, it's very difficult to give the item another life in most situations'.

"Tingira items that are required by the Association for ceremonial or spacial display will be loaned back to the association on an as required base" said Capt Cooper.

The collection items will be split between the East and West coastlines of Australia. Under the new naval museum proposal where HMAS Kuttabul (Sydney) HMAS Albatross (Nowra) HMAS Cerberus (Crib Point) and HMAS Stirling (Garden Island, WA) most items will find a new visible resting place.

The one exception will be that several original Tingira items are about to arrive at HMAS Watson in Sydney.

At the doorway entry to the HMAS Watson Officers Wardroom is a very large replica model of the English Clipper Ship Sobraon (HMAS TINGIRA). The new base Commanding Officer, Commander Aaron Scot, is willing to assist by adding a more visible 'Tingira history flavour' to the base at Sydney's South Head. [ML](#)

1913 the Royal Australian Navy's brand-new fleet sailed through the Heads and into Sydney Harbour. Since then the RAN has served on all the world's oceans in times of peace and war.

During the Second World War, the RAN reached its maximum strength. Approximately 37,000 men and women wore a RAN uniform. The war inflicted a heavy toll on ships and personnel. Thirty-eight cruisers, destroyers, sloops and smaller vessels were sunk and almost 2,200 sailors died on active service.

Since the end of the Second World War, the RAN's fortunes have fluctuated dramatically between lavish acquisitions and slashed defence budgets.

The RAN has sent ships and service personnel to war in Korea, Vietnam and the Persian Gulf. The service has participated in peacekeeping and humanitarian operations all over the globe, at sea, on remote islands and in tri-service deployments. It has played a vital role in protecting our borders and interrupting the international drug trade.

Today the RAN is a highly technical force of state-of-the-art equipment staffed by skilled and dedicated people serving the white ensign in the best traditions of Francis Drake and Horatio Nelson.



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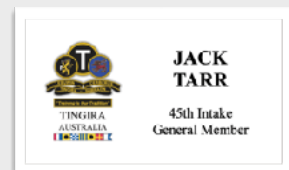

Veterans' and Families' Hub Tweed-North Coast...

RSL LifeCare, in partnership with RSL NSW and sub-Branches, will today receive a \$5.4 million grant from the Federal Government to develop a Veterans' and Families' Hub in the Tweed-North Coast Region.

The announcement follows RSL LifeCare successfully completing the final stage of the bid for the new facility, part of the Government's \$46.7 million commitment to deliver 10 new Veterans' and Families' Hubs across the country.

The new Hub will allow RSL LifeCare to provide access to health and wellbeing services, education, housing, social support, employment support, income and financial support, and assistance with making claims for entitlements and subsequent advocacy to more than 25,761 veterans and their families in the region.

The development complements recently successful bids for new Hubs in Queanbeyan, the Central

Coast and Hunter regions, and a Hub network across the Hawkesbury and South Western Sydney regions. RSL LifeCare also operates four Hubs in Nowra, the Northern Beaches, the Riverina region and in a temporary centre in the Hunter region.

The new facility will enable RSL LifeCare to implement a 'Hub and Spoke' model, developed in consultation with the local communities and other ex-service organisations, through the network of RSL sub-Branches. Through this model, the Veterans' and Families' Hubs act as primary care centres with RSL sub-Branches providing flexible and innovative care solutions for veterans and their families.

RSL LifeCare CEO Janet Muir thanked the Department of Veteran Affairs for recognising the importance of veterans in NSW receiving the care and support that they need.

Minister for Veterans' Affairs Matt Keogh said "I'm glad to see RSL LifeCare are willing to work across the border, supporting veterans in Northern NSW



and Southern Queensland. It's so important that these Hubs are easily accessible to local communities and that they've got good access to services and support close to home.

"I'm confident that the network of Hubs being developed by RSL LifeCare across NSW will be of great value to the national Hub network, where best practice learnings and supports can be shared." Last year, RSL NSW sub-Branches donated \$3.3 million to RSL LifeCare to ensure that veterans and their families continue to receive free critical services and support, including access to local Veterans' and Families' Hubs.

RSL NSW President Mick Bainbridge said "RSL NSW is committed to supporting RSL LifeCare's Veterans' and Families' Hubs because we know they work. "The expansion of Hubs in locations with significant Defence and veteran communities is a strong step in the right direction to bolstering the support we deliver

to Australian servicemen and women, and their families."

RSL LifeCare Veteran Services Executive General Manager, David Anderson, said this accomplishment supported the organisation's ambition to establish centres of support for veterans and their families wherever they're needed.

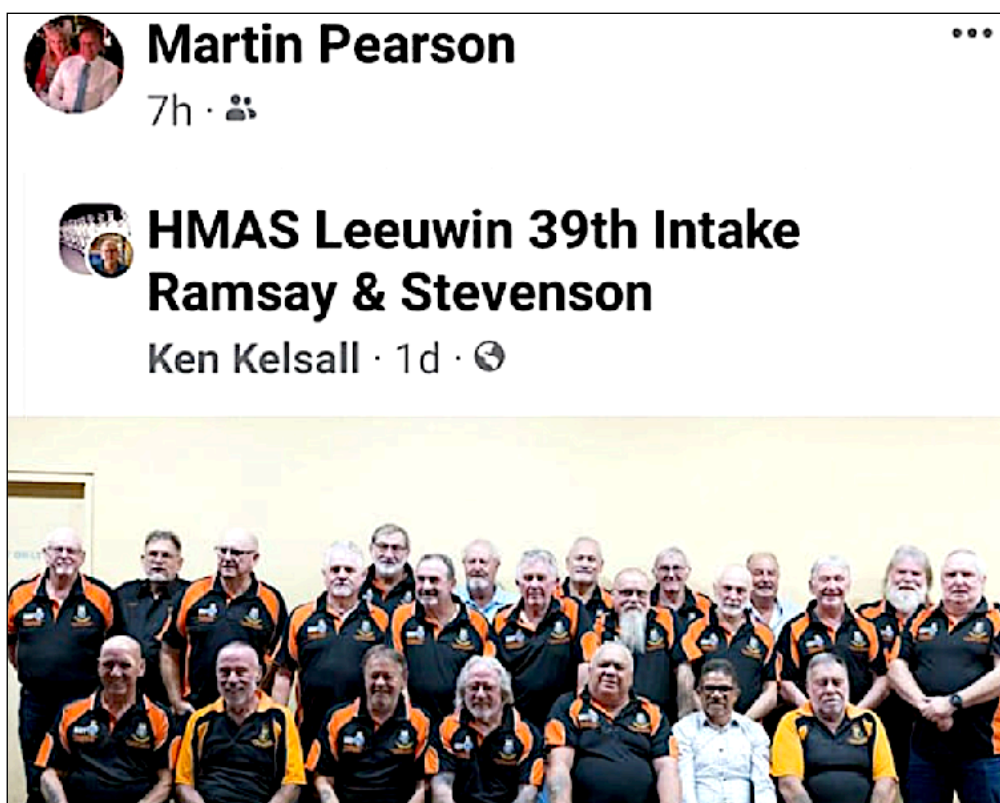
