VIEWFINDER IN RANGE

HISTORICAL IMAGE THIS QUARTER



s a working professional photographer for the past 50 years come this November; I often get asked what is the best camera, what is my best shot, and what is my favourite subject?

Great questions, always a good conversation starter that most people can relate to, after all, Apple has converted most of the world's population into everyday photographers with our modern iPhones

I would like to share with you some very technical camera technology in today's Viewfinder image above. It's not military-related to. After all my wife Margaret, has two sons, a husband, and a daughter-in-law who are all present and past Navy service members, so she knows more about the Navy now than when she met me 40 years ago, that's one angle on todays pic.

Those of you who know me well often ask how is the wife settling into the new country life in the Riverina? Well, here she is, on top of the world as I am too. It's New Year's Eve and after a few sherbets at the local we take an early ticket and head home after the first music set. And then, the picture above comes into my sight.

After leaving the pub beer garden and walking 50 meters up the side street, I saw a few empty silver beer kegs next to the garage wall, lit by an overhead single bulb streetlight from the other side of the road.

It was pitch dark when I asked Margret to take a seat on the keg. The outlined silhouette made me think this could be a nice shot if I can hold my iPhone still enough. This is where today's technology comes to light, photos in the dark.

Thirty years ago this style of image was nearly impossible with film technology. You would require a good camera, fast lens, high-speed film and a tripod for a possible long exposure; a combination of science at its best and not something you are carrying home after a few at the pub!

Under the bonnet of the iPhone is the secret to all this. It's the modern darkroom where the photographic magic happens these days. Some people proceed to the next level to touch up the original with Photoshop; I try to stay with raw images and just get the shot right at the first attempt.. a nice frame is the finishing touch!

This image above is all about the minute camera sensors, autofocus system and most of all the photographer with some nerve and ability to point the small lens in the right direction and keep a finger very still on the glass shutter button. Also helps to make sure there is no fingerprint on the lens as it leaves a nice soft focus effect!

I am often amazed when I see results like this. Margaret probably won't like it, 99% of people don't like their own image until some say, "Wow, that's a nice shot." In the long run, we photographers aim for a positive comment from a third set of eyes!

So the wrap is: best camera - the one in your hand; best shot - should be the last one you took and my favourite subject, 'the family' of course!

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



I'llI'll keep this short as an introduction since I am unsure if this will hold any interest or relevance to Tingira.

About me

A Melbourne boy who joined the 82nd intake at Leeuwin 04/01/1983 followed by ETS training at HMAS Cerberus and then time at HMAS Watson.

I was then deployed to HMAS Derwent during her half-life refit at BAE in Williamstown, then commissioning trials and a trip up the South East Asia.

I was discharged not long after that tour, however, I am still in contact with quite a few of the navy boys from my days.

Reason for the email

In Williamstown, Victoria, there is a community organisation called Seaworks. I have been a volunteer board member for 15 years.

We have 2.6 hectares of waterfront Crown land under lease from Parks Victoria, which have the management rights vested in them. Our purpose is to preserve the Maritime history of Williamstown and Melbourne because we occupy the site of the original Melbourne Harbour trust Workshops Est circa 1877, where all of the original Port of Melbourne deepening works were based, so we have a long history.

We have a Museum on-site which has a comprehensive maritime collection as well as many original records from the Melbourne Harbour Trust and the old Polly Woodside collection and on and on.We are unfunded and generate our own revenue to operate and upgrade the site.

We have a fairly substantial Navy collection because we are located next to BAE and have inherited some models and had collections donated.

The 10 Tonne anchor installation at the front was a personal mission of mine to source, fabricate a cradle, paint and install.

My question is do you know about the Seaworks Maritime Museum? If not, it is worth a visit and may add value to the Tingira members to know about it.



MATURE AGE SAILOR GEOFF ANTHONY PENCIL & BRUSH ...

ne of the other 'hats' that I have worn in my past line of multi-media duties was some very senior involvement with RSL NSW and the RSL Cumberland sub-Branch over the past decade, mainly in administration and communication with the membership and the general public. They were good times for me. RSL opened many doors and I then encountered exciting new boundaries. The 'old school' RSL boys taught me a lot about our wartime history and I certainly learnt the difference between 'commemoration and celebration'.

It was during this period I also met many new people in my life circle and certainly different walks of life, all having their own unique and interesting storylines. A Navy sailor, Leading Seaman Geoff Anthony, is one such person I met along my RSL Journey.

Geoff is not a Navy Tingira Boy, however, he is a second time mature age entry recruit into today's Royal Australian Navy. His story is close to my heart, as maritime art with pencil, ink, brush and paint, is something that I could easily have been on the same journey.

I took up those tools at the young age of 12, however, it was the fascination with photographic film that took my imagination to a new level. When 'Brother Damian' at the Warragul Marist Brothers College took me into photography class and showed me the magic of the dark room, I was instantly hooked like many others when seeing the chemical and scientific side of photography with the ghost of the image appearing on paper from a chemical solution.

I was also inspired when I first met Geoff Anthony at a Navy RSL function. His artwork has an instant hook. A unique style with water colour backgrounds. They are very pleasing to the eye, every picture has a story and they could hang anywhere, from miniatures to wall size. Geoff is the first to assist 'Team Tingira' with the odd artwork and this is his story ML

come from the seaside town of Dee Why on the Northern beaches of Sydney. My dad was a boiler maker, uncle and my cousins were all Plumbers. I have two older sisters, a younger sister and two younger brothers. I was number three in the pecking order.

I have had relatives in every theatre of war this country has been involved in. World War II, however, nearly wiped the family out. They were all mostly Army or RAAF and that generation; to date, I am the first sailor in the crew!

I attended the local primary school and then moved on to the new Cromer High School in 1977. The school system was good to me from a very young age and I naturally took on the 'art' class.

In High School, I used to draw portraits of my mates, but was failed as an art subject due to arguments with my art teachers. They alway

wanted me to forget 'how I did things' and use their method. My argument was "That isn't art that's being a parrot", I think I proved my point 40-odd years later!

Growing up in Dee Why it's difficult to resist the lure of the rolling surf with the Tasman Sea on my doorstep. Surfing was and still is my other love in life! I still surf now, although I'm not as light on my feet as I used to be.

My Mum wanted me to pursue my artistic side as a career after those school years. She could see my early potential with a pencil and brush! However, coming from a 'family of plumbers', I was pushed into an apprenticeship—all good. I stuck it out and was quite good at it in the end!

Then, in 1990, at 26 years of age, I got the itch to do something with my life.

Getting out of Sydney, traveling anywhere, and exploring new horizons were top of my list, and the Navy was now my telescope after seeing a few dramatic TV commercials around that period. 'Wet, Cold, Homesick & Frightened' comes to the front of my mind, with some dramatic sea images that got me in,

let's go navy - along with many others young lads back then.

I initially joined The Royal Australian Navy as a 'Direct Entry Trade Plumber' (Chippy) in 1990.

On the far outreaches of Victoria's Westernport district, I graduated from HMAS Cerberus Recruit School, class GE67, and then completed my initial engineering training at Marine Engineering and Electrical School, also at Cerberus.

My first posting 1991, was onto one of the newer ships in the navy's fleet at the time, FFG HMAS Canberra.

My Marine Engineering Officer on board the Canberra was chatting about my direct entry process and my plumbing qualifications and experience. He gave me a couple of 'fire main' repair tasks to prove myself and sent a signal off to Fleet Head Quarters, saying I was way above the pack in experience.

Within two days I was packing my kit bag and heading for HMAS Nirimba, the Navy

apprentice training School at Schofields in Sydney outer Western suburbs.

After my Nirimba stint for two years, I was then posted to HMAS Kuttabul at Garden Island, Sydney, to the Fleet Industrial Maintenance Arm (FIMA) working on a pipe-fitting team.

We installed fire main extensions through the vehicle decks of both support ships HMAS Tobruk and HMAS Jervis Bay. Working around the clock in shifts in order to have them both ready to sail to Somalia was the challenge at hand. It was a big task at the time and we came up trumps, a warm sense of team achievement, which was a first for me in the navy workplace.

I went home and packed kit bag, got back to Garden Island, then my Divisional Officer changed his mind (after initially saying yes) stating that "I was needed here", really I thought? I had joined the navy to go to sea, and see the world, not take a jaunt across town to Sydney Harbour from Dee Why to Potts Point!

I was so disappointed at the time and very frustrated. I knew as a plumber I could make much better money ashore, so when my four-

year term was up, I opted for the money. No sea time, no Geoff, no voyage in four years!

This is the same scenario today with so many service people. I think nothing has changed in all these years. I have seen so many good people leave the Navy and it's usually always the attractive dollar that dictates the decision, so I walked too in 1995.

Moving forward two decades, after a messy divorce I was at a loose end in 2017.

After a rush of blood to my head decided to join up again. The Navy was very happy to accommodate me as recruiting numbers were down then as they still are today, anyone with qualifications and a good past Navy background was a long way up the shortlist for re-entry.

A good mate of mine from my first service days was also re-joining so we had a \$50 bet to see who could get in first and stay the longest!

After my initial training at Cerberus, this time with a few grey hairs on display to make me part of the 'new generation' stand out 'Mature Age Recruit' group. Fortunately, I did have a few other mates at the same stage in life! After this I was drafted, off to sea this time, the Navy knew where I wanted to be, and my first ship was to be FFG HMAS Melbourne.

We did a four-month deployment through South East Asia, stopping in Japan and Guam twice then Qingdao China

Qingdao China was very memorable port for the fact we were there for ANZAC Day and conducted a dawn service on the forecastle, certainly different from marching George Street a few times back in Sydney.

On that day in Qingdao, we were all kitted up on the quarterdeck in our W1s at attention and then it started snowing. We were all freezing. Our Commanding Officer Commander Marcus Buttler, decided it would be a great time to deliver a very long speech.

A few tots of rum in the Juniors Sailors mess was a good start for the rest of the day as we then descended into town at Qingdao to toast

our ANZAC forebears. It was a good day and a great port visit when I balance it up against many others I have had since that run ashore.

After Asia, HMAS Melbourne then commenced a decommissioning trip with a 'Freedom of Entry' through Melbourne. Towards the end of my posting, I received the good news of my next sea-going posting. My next ship was the brand-new DDG HMAS Hobart, this should be good!

I loved serving on her she gave me more awesome memories. Even though we did the COVID-19 deployment (no stepping at all) for 117 sea days, I managed to have a good time and it was here I started painting again.

All the crew knew I was into the art thing, they loved my paintings, and watching me paint. This is why I started painting at night in repair bases, so nobody could see me. It's daunting with anyone looking over your shoulder at the best of times.

As a 'Damage Control Yeoman', the repair bases on the ship were mine. After my daily

watch, I was into my downtime, 'art time'. I would sit and sketch for hours!

After Hobart, I was back at Fleet Supply Unit (the new FIMA) in 2020 for several months where I started selling some of my artworks and paintings. It was around this time I first met Tingira VOICEpipe editor Mark Lee, at an RSL Navy function.

Mark seemed to know his way around how to get things published and sold. he has a real knack for public relations and marketing.

"Navy Trained" he would often remind me! We have had a great relationship since those early days of 2020. We have ventured into several projects together over this 'art voyage' so far. Today is another one of those opportunities, this time however I'm on the keyboard not the brush!

After a few large paintings later I was posted to HMAS Brisbane, again as the Kellick Damage Control Yeoman. On board Brisbane, we completed a four-month Regional Presence Deployment (RPD) through South East Asia. Also participated in two 'Talisman Sabre' deployment exercises, tough days!

On our way back from the RPD, a cyclone was blowing and we had to put about unscheduled to Ellis Island. Here we would rescue several stranded people at the local weather station. Then it was a rough ride home to Aus from out there! You don't forget those sea days when I see the film clips of navy ships in those big rough choppy seas, "been there done that" is the Jack Tarr saying I can rest upon with many other old salty shipmates!

The big moment in Brisbane was when I won the Christmas hamper raffle on the flight deck as we were de-ammunition on our last night out, the wife loved that one to come home to!

I am now the Centre Manager at Navy Innovations, Fleet Base East, Garden Island. I am continuing to paint more and more and set up a studio space at home in which to paint (not at the kitchen table). I can develop my style and improve on where I am at.

My immediate future seems set in the Navy and I am very content with that. I have just extended my compulsory retirement date by a few years and hope to do this again in the near future. Recruiting numbers are still low so it's a good time I guess!

Being a 'Stoker' was a blast. I still have many close friendships from those early days with my first service call.

The guys and now gals, I call my brothers and sisters and I am fiercely proud of them all though many of them are much younger than me.

I ask those reading, to please look upon the new-age sailors with respect. I know the current generation lacks a lot in some areas, but these navy guys and gals today are the exceptions to their civvy street counterparts; they are here and proudly wearing the uniform of our country, BZ team Navy I say.

With a range of new ships set to join the fleet in coming years, I would love to paint them all during their commissioning periods.

I know the current generation lacks a lot, but these new generation sailors are the exception. They are here and proudly wear the uniform and respect our flag.

I am currently working on a few projects. A couple of presentations and commissioning work for the Cape Class patrol boat HMAS Cape Woolamai.

As for my immediate future?

I am now n my extension CRA years and I intend continue serving. Of course I will continue painting warships. I'm happy to keep working to order. I've only ever had a couple of difficult clients, as most who order my work, know how I paint and like my style.

I will continue to exhibit my work at every opportunity with the 'Australian Society of Marine Artists' but will branch out soon into the solo exhibition world.



We'd like to thank our veterans and families who have reached out for support and trusted us with their wellbeing at some of their most vulnerable times.


Our team are dedicated to supporting you.

or 90 years veterans and their families have donated objects to which they ascribe great value to the Anzac Memorial. Some of those objects are of unquestionable aesthetic and financial value. Some appear quite mundane, their significance requiring explanation and interpretation. All are treasures.

This exhibition comprises a selection of treasures of the Anzac Memorial collection. The choices were made by the curatorial and collection management staff. The selection is subjective and by no means definitive. New treasures are being donated all the time.

In 1934 Great War veteran, lawyer and author S Elliot Napier wrote of the Anzac Memorial that "as the men of 1914-1918... are gathered to the valley of the shadows" the rooms of the Memorial "will be transformed into reliquaries wherein may be placed such tributes and mementoes to the men of 1914-1918 as may be deemed appropriate. Thus will the Memorial gather to itself its full spiritual message for delivery to future generations of Australians."

We hope that our choices have lived up to the ideals of those of Napier's generation and through their display provide examples of the courage, endurance and sacrifice of those whose lives have been touched by war from colonial times to the present day.





Ms Dikovskaya holds a Masters of Applied Finance and is a Certified Financial Planner through the Financial Planning Association.




