Our bank (Westpac) has been excellent to deal with and was very generous with the Chairman and CEO making a \$10k donation to support our gathering, along with some of the funds being recovered as investigations continue.

Similarly, the team at Optus Stadium, ASAP Press, Navy Seapower, HMAS Stirling, RSL LifeCare and Cumberland RSL sub-Branch have also assisted us after the fraud event, allowing the arrangements to proceed "Full steam ahead"!


We have recovered from what is becoming all too common in today's electronic exchanges, and while we wish to be transparent with our members about the event, we also want to share our experience as a warning to stay vigilant as such activities continue to increase.

Notwithstanding this disruption, Mark and the Tingira committee team continue to work tirelessly to prepare and deliver a JR Reunion program with something for everyone.

The opportunity to revisit our old stomping ground and especially to commemorate Remembrance Day alongside the Chief of Navy VADM Mark Hammond, AO, surrounded by those familiar buildings and parade ground at Leeuwin Barracks.



## STRATEGIC SHIPBUILDING

Agreement secures continuous pipeline of shipbuilding work for WA

he Albanese Government is securing a continuous pipeline of shipbuilding work in Western Australian and creating thousands of jobs through the execution of the Strategic Shipbuilding Agreement with Australia's newly established Strategic Shipbuilder, Austal Defence Shipbuilding Australia Pty Ltd.

For too long, the Australian shipbuilding industry has lacked the consistent work needed to develop a competitive and reliable shipbuilding capability. This has had a flow-on effect of hindering the development of Australian-made Defence capabilities and resilience in our shipbuilding industry.

The Strategic Shipbuilding Agreement will provide the framework for a steady pipeline of projects to be delivered by Austal, granted it continues to perform and meet a range of conditions. This arrangement will enable the stability and long-term planning required to accelerate the delivery of sovereign defence capabilities in Western Australia that meet the needs of the Australian Defence Force over the coming decades.

As the Strategic Shipbuilder, Austal will work closely with local industry and supply chains to develop the skills and resources required for this task.



The Strategic Shipbuilding Agreement builds on already-established relationship between Defence and Austal for construction of the Guardian class and Evolved Cape class Patrol Boats, and will see the delivery of dozens of vessels, with pilot programs to include:

- 18 Landing Craft Medium for the Australian Army
- subject to further approvals and negotiations, the build of eight Landing Craft Heavy

Together, the Landing Craft Medium and Landing Craft Heavy projects are expected to create 1,100 direct jobs and more than 2,000 indirect jobs.

The Strategic Shipbuilding Agreement will also play a vital role in the establishment of a Commonwealth Defence Precinct at Henderson – underpinning tens of billions of dollars of investment in Defence capabilities in the West over the next two decades and supporting in the order of 10,000 high-skilled jobs.

As one of two major shipbuilding hubs in Australia, Henderson is an asset of national importance and pivotal to the build and sustainment of vessels for the Australian Defence Force.

The Albanese Government is committed to working with the Cook Labor Government to develop the industry, infrastructure and workforce needed to secure continuous naval shipbuilding in Western Australia.

tuart and Naomi McIntosh are the co-founders and owners of Chief's Son Distillery located on the Mornington Peninsular in southern Victoria.

Having grown up and attended the same school in the Blue Mountains, Stuart went on to graduate from the Royal Military College, Duntroon, in 1990, while Naomi completed a Science degree at the Australian National University in 1992.

They married in 1994, and until 2005 were posted across Australia and overseas, including on exchange with the British Army, and several operational deployments for Stuart.

As an Artillery officer, he was very proud to be a Forward Observer and Naval Gunfire Support Liaison Officer, calling indirect fire from several DDGs of the time.

Alongside his military commitments, Stuart completed an Arts degree at the University of New England, and from the mid-1990s both he and Naomi commenced studying finance at Deakin University. Upon separating from the Army, they jointly established a financial practice focused on complex legal structures, companies, and trusts.

In 2009, with the birth of their daughter, they relocated to the Mornington Peninsula, once again surrounded by bush, nature, and space. Twin boys soon followed in 2011, completing the family. Around the same time, a lifechanging event unfolded.

While Naomi was caring for the newborn twins, the couple won a trip to Scotland to tour the Speyside whisky region.

With Naomi unable to travel, Stuart and his father embraced the opportunity with enthusiasm. What began as a spark of inspiration soon became a test bed, then a passion, and ultimately one of Australia's largest family-owned whisky distilleries.

#### Dream became reality ...

Stuart and Naomi were able to draw on a lifetime of education, skills, and experience to turn that moment into what is now Chief's Son Distillery.

Today, Chief's Son Distillery provides significant ongoing support to the Australian Defence Force, past and present, by producing memorabilia for personal achievements and unit milestones, including graduations, long service, commissioning's, and anniversaries.

#### **OUR HISTORY...**

The concept for Chief's Son Distillery was born through a collision of opportunity and passion, yet it was ultimately built on a captivatingly true and powerful story of chance, risk and passion, but also history, love and family.

The distillery was established in 2013 by Stuart and Naomi McIntosh, and after three years of test bed success the first commercial batch of single malt whisky was distilled at the current Somerville location.

#### **CONNECTIONS...**

Whisky is a powerful spirit that forges deeper connections between people, families and generations.

In our family whisky has been a common thread throughout the ages. For the past 500 years of our family's long history, whisky has been at the epicentre of love and laughter, life and death, tears and triumphs.

Our ancestors transformed exactly the same ingredients, utilised the same ancient craft and derived the same level of enjoyment as we do today. And going forward, whisky reaches so far forward past our futures, connecting through the generations.

#### **OUR NAME...**

Our surname, McIntosh, or Mhic an Tòisich in Scottish Gaelic actually means 'Son of the Chief'.

This battle honour was awarded to our family 900 years ago for ongoing loyalty to the Chiefs of Alba (Kings of Scotland). We are passionate about loyalty, the intergenerational, meaning of our name and passing on the love of whisky from generation to generation.

#### 25 WORDS OR LESS...

Have you ever wondered who wins those '25 Words or Less' competitions?

Well, we do!

Many years ago the following words were scribed by Stuart's father, Alasdair McIntosh, resulting in the richest whisky research and planning trip that directly resulted in the establishment of Chief's Son Distillery.

"My grandparents passed the love of whisky through my parents to me and I want to make sure my children pass it onto their children."

### HOW IS WHISKY MADE?

s did our ancestral lines of the Molntosh's of Edradour Distillery and the Mackenzie's of Dalmore Distillery, we follow the traditional, double distillation method through our open pot still. However before and after the actual still, we really do modernise and push the boundaries of Single Malt Whisky.

Our raw materials and methods of distillation and maturation respect tradition, but place a far greater emphasis on extracting full and complex flavours from the highest quality ingredients, including yeast, malt and barrels.

This means that we exploit inefficiencies created in such things as higher malting temperatures (lower yield), longer fermentations (richer flavours), tighter distilling parameters (lower yield), smaller and 1st fill barrels, embracing our varied climate and very strict parameters for finished products.

We retain control and regulate all of the inputs in the process including barley selection, malting parameters, brewing controls, barrel selection, coopering techniques, distilling cuts, maturation periods, bottling percentage and spirit selection.

We're also significantly different to many distilleries, in that we create four different single malt recipes and generally age the new make in the same French oak sherry / apera barrels. Whilst this is logistically hard, it allows us to appeal to a much broader range of whisky drinkers.

Sourced from the Riverina region of Australia, this Chief's Son malt was developed through 2013 & 2014 and whilst the Malting House no longer exists, our friends at Voyager Malts now undertake all of our local malt production. This ability to craft your own malt is critical in the profile of our spirit.

#### YESTERDAY'S HISTORY

## COCKATOO ISLAND DOCKYARD



#### HMAS TINGIRA

along with many of her 'old boys'
saw out their working days
at Cockatoo Island Dockyard
in their life after navy;
a brief look at the islands working history...

ike most engineers, I have long been aware of the Cockatoo Island Dockyard. When I was launched downstream at Kirribilli, the dockyard was at one of its peaks, but now it's just a faint memory in my retirement.

Together with the NSW Railways Eveleigh Workshops and the Engineering Workshops of The Colonial Sugar Refining Company Ltd (CSR), these establishments, born in colonial times, became the major "jobbing shops" in Sydney when I trained in CSR as an Indentured Engineer at Pyrmont in the period 1959 to 1963.

To have done so in any one of them was considered to be a mark of high standing, and with hindsight, it was privilege.


None of these shops exist today, but archives suggest Cockatoo Island

Dockyard had the widest breadth of

capability, and was the largest in heavy engineering terms.

Few people ever visited, though some CSR trainees experienced prearranged excursions in the 1950's (but not me). Some CSR staff saw the island when involved with overhaul work on sugar mill turbines and motor armatures or when CSR ships such as SS Rona dry docked, etc. Leo Whitby (now into his 80's) well remembers this. In a recent discussion with him, he commented,

"We lived in the best of times as engineers". When one considers the closure of engineering shops and industries that were once the substance of Australia's Industrial Development in the 19 th C, there is meaning in these words, particularly on Cockatoo Island, when you walk among the remains of the once proud dockyard.





Although mine was a sideline view of that which always follows sale or closure of such facilities, I think a lot more can be done to preserve and display, in a curatorial sense, the history at the sites noted; Building shells alone don't do this (and for that reason I have written about CSR history in the past. John Jeremy has done it for "Cockatoo", as noted at the end of this essay, and I am grateful for his published work that is the principal source I use as reference to the dockyard history).

Since closure in the early 1990's, and removal of most machine tools and equipment, the island has come under the control of the Sydney Harbour Federation Trust.

Established by the Australian Government to manage this and other harbour sites, but left mainly to fund itself. It is said it has a broad cultural focus, that includes camping and concerts, but other than making use of the location, this use escapes my understanding of relevance to the site's heritage.

An exhibition of shipyard photos went on display at Biloela House on the upper level of the island. It enables a public peek into some of the photo records, be it something of an empty reminder when you walk among the crane structures and buildings (more could be done to link these and explain at each remaining building site, what went on within – particularly in the Turbine Hall & adjoining Heavy Machine Shops).

Given the foregoing and the parallel \* between the "Cockatoo" closure in 1991 and that of the CSR Workshops in 1975, I visited recently with my three grandchildren, read a couple of books I had collected over the years in preparation, and record the experience here with a few pictures of "then and now".


It is the sense of "loss" that is referred to, not the "scale of the impact", because when CSR closed its shop the workforce numbered less than 100, whereas with the Dockyard, well in excess of 2,000 were retrenched.

Cockatoo Island is the largest of the nine islands in Sydney Harbour. Prior to white settlement, the island was around 12.8 hectares, triangular shaped, with a hill about 18 M high on a sandstone base.

The appearance has altered beyond recognition since 1839, when Governor Gipps first had 17 bottle shaped air tight chambers proposed to store wheat, 21 ft dia. x 23 ft deep, hand cut into the rock.

Over time, the flattening of the hill and excavations for dry docks and

slipways, increased the island area at high water to 17.6 hectares.

Thereafter the island has served for various penal and military activities until Fitzroy Dock\* was constructed, and industrial use thereafter resulted in an ever changing topography for the island. Gipps first planned for the dry dock in 1843, but it took until 1857 before the first ship entered.

It is sometimes referred to as a "graving" dock, an expression that comes from old maritime language meaning, "to burn off the impurities from a ships bottom and reapply the tar when the tide is out"- a process otherwise done when the ship lay on its side, known as careening. The alternative of a "dry" dock is self evident. Biloela House when it served as quarters for female warders in the 1890's.

Following opening of Fitzroy Dock, most ship repair and ship building work carried out in the dockyard was for the NSW Colony official needs.

Then later for the Australian Navy (peaking in WW1 when the workforce exceeded 4.000 tradesmen & apprentices and later in WW2).


Other State and Commonwealth Govt. vessels were designed and built, and some private work was undertaken including docking of SS Rona.

The crane Titan had a special importance for Sydney as it was the barge mounted heavy lift crane (max lift 150 tons) that served the harbour for some 70 years. The crane structure was designed and built by Cowans Sheldon & Co at Carlisle in England, then shipped out, whereas the pontoon was purpose built for Sydney Harbour in the Cockatoo Shipyard. It went into service in 1919.



## Engineers' and Blacksmiths' Shop

**Building 138** 

This is one of the oldest industrial buildings remaining in Sydney. From it grew all of the dockyard's subsequent workshops. It ultimately became the most comprehensive engineering facility in Australia, associated with all shipbuilding and repairs undertaken at Cockatoo Island over 150 years of operation.


A product of the nineteenth-century English convict system, the stone was cut and carved on the island entirely by convicts, with at least some of the decorative stonework over window and door openings attributed to a prisoner named Swan in the 1860s.

The original building was modelled on a building in Portsmouth in the United Kingdom, where the British Navy was converting from sail to steam. Both buildings had a pitched roof and a bell tower in the centre. It is one of a small number of British Admiralty type buildings surviving worldwide.

The southern section contained the Machine Shop, and was filled with lathes, presses and machine tools. The northern half contained the Blacksmiths' Shop and was fitted with hearths and steam hammers. In 1912, the bell tower was demolished and a second storey was added, which contained a Brass Finishing Shop. Throughout the twentieth century this building was known as either the Machine Shop or the Front Machine Shop.

This building contains the oldest crane on Cockatoo Island, dating from the 1870s. A unique, hand-operated timber crane on its original tracks, this overhead travelling crane has been restored by Sydney Harbour Federation Trust Heritage Volunteers. It is one of the most valuable pieces of dockyard history that still remains on Cockatoo Island.

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## THE LAST SHIP – HMAS SUCCESS HMAS Success on No 1 Slipway in 1983:

Launched in 1984, (commissioned in 1986), 157.2 x 21.2 x 8.6 M, 18,000 t full load displacement. She is the largest ship built in Sydney (& Australia) for the RAN. HMAS Success is classed as an Auxiliary Oiler Replenishment (AOR) vessel and has served in Kuwait (1991) and East Timor (1999).

or 90 years veterans and their families have donated objects to which they ascribe great value to the Anzac Memorial. Some of those objects are of unquestionable aesthetic and financial value. Some appear quite mundane, their significance requiring explanation and interpretation. All are treasures.

This exhibition comprises a selection of treasures of the Anzac Memorial collection. The choices were made by the curatorial and collection management staff. The selection is subjective and by no means definitive. New treasures are being donated all the time.

In 1934 Great War veteran, lawyer and author S Elliot Napier wrote of the Anzac Memorial that "as the men of 1914-1918... are gathered to the valley of the shadows" the rooms of the Memorial "will be transformed into reliquaries wherein may be placed such tributes and mementoes to the men of 1914-1918 as may be deemed appropriate. Thus will the Memorial gather to itself its full spiritual message for delivery to future generations of Australians."

We hope that our choices have lived up to the ideals of those of Napier's generation and through their display provide examples of the courage, endurance and sacrifice of those whose lives have been touched by war from colonial times to the present day.

Entry is free and open daily, 9am-5pm.

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# RSL ANZAC VILLAGE REDEFINES AGEING

Veteran and Senior Voices Driving Inclusive, Future-Focused living ...



SL LifeCare is proposing a transformation of RSL ANZAC Village—one of the Northern Beaches' most iconic communities.

The renewal will reimagine the 86-year-old site as a modern, tranquil village for veterans and seniors, where independence, wellbeing and connection are at the heart of everyday life.

This is the first time that RSL ANZAC Village has undergone a co-ordinated, site-wide masterplan. While over 30 individual developments have shaped the Village over the decades, this evolution brings a deliberate, future-focused vision—one that honours the past while meeting the expectations of current and future

generations. The staged redevelopment, delivered over the next 10-15 years, will allow residents to continue enjoying village life as new services, amenities and homes are introduced.

"We are deeply proud of the legacy of RSL ANZAC Village and what it has meant to thousands of veterans and seniors, and the broader community over the decades," said Janet Muir, CEO of RSL LifeCare.

"This masterplan allows us to build on that foundation in a way that is cohesive, inclusive and true to our purpose to enrich the lives of veterans and seniors. It's about creating a place where people continue to feel safe, valued and connected—now and into the future."

The renewal has been shaped in close consultation with residents, team members, veterans and the wider community.

RSL LifeCare is encouraging broad participation through its 'Have Your Say portal', where community members can provide feedback, and register for updates.

Local residents and community representatives are also invited to express interest in joining the Community Reference Group, which will meet regularly throughout the planning process.

"We want this to be a community-led transformation," said Janet Muir. "Whether you're a neighbour, a veteran, a team member or someone with a personal connection to the Village, your insights will help shape the next chapter. We're inviting people to share their voice and be part of designing a future that reflects what matters most to our residents and community."

At its core are two new proposed precincts—a Lifestyle and Wellness Precinct and a Main Street and Health Precinct—connected by walkable green spaces, nature trails, and places for veteran commemoration.

Outdated buildings that no longer meet modern standards will be replaced with new homes in a variety of sizes and styles, supporting resident choice and evolving care needs.

This bold reimagining comes as the Northern Beaches faces a critical shortage of seniors' housing. According to the ABS, the region is already short by 1,500 dwellings suitable for seniors, with demand growing by 200 homes each year.

Additionally, across New South Wales, the aged care sector faces an alarming shortfall of 65.000 workers over the next decade.

The RSL ANZAC Village renewal addresses both challenges with innovative housing for seniors, and providing workplaces for aged care workers that support, retain and attract skilled, compassionate carers.

The renewal is also expected to generate local employment opportunities, stimulate construction and service industry activity, and increase access to high-quality, integrated health and wellbeing services for the region's growing older population. RSL LifeCare plans to lodge applications as a State Significant Development with the NSW Department of Planning, Housing and Infrastructure in late 2025.

"This isn't just about updating buildings -it's about reimagining how we live as a community," Ms Muir said. "Residents consistently tell us they value independence, diversity and connection.

This transformation honours our legacy while creating a living environment that reflects how veterans and seniors want to age—with dignity, vibrancy and purpose."





# SECRET STRIKE

War on our Shores ...



his year marks the 80th anniversary of the end of World War II. To commemorate this historic milestone the Australian National Maritime Museum will show an exhibition focusing on the Japanese midget submarine attack on Sydney Harbour.

#### Secret strike - War on our shores

This exhibition features the stern section of the midget submarine *M22* and voice pipes from the HMAS *Kuttabul*.

The exhibition explores the raid and includes historic images of the aftermath of the attack and firsthand accounts of the impact the raid had on ordinary people's lives.

Please note, this exhibition is located in Wharf 7, adjacent to the main Museum building and is not open on weekends or public holidays.

In the opening weeks of 1942, for most Sydney residents the war seemed far away.

By February however, Darwin had been bombed by Japanese aircraft, followed in quick succession by towns in north Queensland, Western Australia and the Torres Strait Islands. The war was suddenly getting closer.

Despite this, many still considered Sydney was a safe-haven, far behind the front lines and safe from attack. It wasn't until three top secret Japanese midget submarines brought the realities of war to Sydney, that this illusion of safety was shattered.

On the evening of 31 May and the early morning of 1 June 1942, three Type A Kō-hyōteki midget submarines penetrated Sydney Harbour's defences to attack allied shipping.

During the raid the HMAS *Kuttabul*, a former Sydney ferry converted into a

depot ship, was sunk killing 19 Australian and two British sailors.

Two of the midget submarines were sunk in the Harbour and recovered almost immediately.

On 3 June, the sailors from HMAS *Kuttabul* and the four crew from the Japanese midget submarines *M22* and *M27* were buried in Sydney with full military honours. In 1943, the remains of the Japanese crews were exhumed, cremated and returned to Japan via diplomatic exchange.

The midget submarine *M24*, that fired the faithful torpedo sinking the *Kuttabul* was the only one to escape the harbour.


Its final fate remained a mystery until 2006, when it was found virtually intact in the waters off Bungan Head, on Sydney's Northern Beaches with the remains of its two-crew entombed inside.
